AROUND THE SEC

• **Vanderbilt's A.J. Ogilvy**, a 6-foot-11, 250-pound junior center from Sydney, Australia., was named the SEC Player of the Week after he averaged 22.0 points and 6.0 rebounds in leading the Commodores to victories over Missouri and DePaul. Ogilvy made 7-of-10 of his field goal attempts and went 11-of-12 from the free throw line to lead Vanderbilt with 25 points and six rebounds against Missouri. It marked the ninth time in his career that he has scored 20 or more points in a game. He made 13-of-15 free throws against DePaul to score a team-high 19 points to go with six rebounds. It was the most free throws made by a Commodore since the 2003-04 season and helped push his career scoring total to 1,124 points.



• **Kentucky's John Wall**, a 6-foot-4, 195-pound guard from Raleigh, N.C., was named SEC Freshman of the Week after he averaged 14.0 points, 10.5 assists and 4.5 rebounds in leading the Wildcats to wins over UNC Asheville and 10th-ranked North Carolina. He recorded a double-double with 12 points and 14 assists to go with six steals against UNC Asheville. The 14 assists are a UK freshman record and the most by a Wildcat since Travis Ford had 15 in 1994. He had 16 points and seven assists against North Carolina despite missing seven minutes of the second half with cramps. His two free throws with four seconds left iced the win for Kentucky.



• The third annual SEC/Big East Invitational will be held Dec. 9 in New York City and Dec. 10 Tampa, Fla. The two-night men's college basketball event begins with a doubleheader in New York City on Dec. 9 followed by a doubleheader in Tampa on Dec. 10. The games at Madison Square Garden in New York City feature Georgia taking on St. John's at 7 p.m. ET on ESPN2, followed by Kentucky facing Connecticut at 9:30 p.m. on ESPN. Also part of the event is a Dec. 10 doubleheader at St. Pete Times Forum in Tampa, featuring Mississippi State vs. DePaul at 6:30 p.m. ET on ESPN2, followed by Florida vs. Syracuse at 9:00 p.m. on ESPN. • With four blocks against Bethune-Cookman on Nov. 21, Mississippi State's Jarvis Varnado became the SEC's all-time blocked shot leader, breaking Shaquille O'Neal's (LSU) record of 412 from 1990-92. Varnado currently ranks 11th in NCAA Division I history with 431 career blocks.

• Five SEC teams are receiving mention in the Dec. 7 Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today preseason polls. Kentucky (4th Associated Press/4th ESPN/USA Today), Tennessee (9th/9th), Florida (10th/11th), Ole Miss (25th/rv) and Vanderbilt (rv/24th) are each listed among the Top 25.

SEC Highlights

- Five the SEC's top 10 scorers from 2008-09 return for 2009-10. USC's Devan Downey is the league's top returning scorer at 19.8 points per game.
- Seven of the league's top 10 rebounders from last season return for 2009-10. Arkansas' Michael Washington led the SEC with 9.8 boards per game.
- Eight of the conference's top 10 assist leaders from 2008-09 return for 2009-10. Arkansas' Courtney Fortson is the top returning setup man after leading all SEC freshmen with 5.9 assists per game last season.
- Five players that earned first team All-SEC honors from the league's coaches are on SEC rosters for 2009-10. Kentucky's Patrick Patterson, LSU's Tasmin Mitchell, Mississippi State's Jarvis Varnado, South Carolina's Devan Downey and Tennessee's Tyler Smith are were first team all-conference selections in 2008-09. An additional five players that earned second team All-SEC accolades also return.
- For the first time in league history, each of the 96 conference games will be televised live as part of the SEC's historic 15-year agreements with CBS Sports and ESPN that begin this year. Almost half of the SEC's league games will be distributed nationally with ESPN or ESPN2 televising 27 contests, ESPNU showing eight and CBS Sports five. The SEC's games on the ESPN family of networks will be exclusively branded as the "SEC on ESPN."
- National coverage of the SEC Basketball Tournament has been expanded with the semifinals and championship game broadcast on ESPN on ABC. The SEC Network will televise the first two rounds of the tournament which this year will be played March 11-14 in Nashville.
- Florida's Billy Donovan will be honored with the John R. Wooden Award's "Legends of Coaching Award" at the Los Angeles Athletic Club in April of 2010.
- The SEC/Big East Invitational returns for a third season and will feature four games in two days. Opening the event is Georgia vs. St. John's and Kentucky vs. Connecticut in New York City Dec. 9. The following night will showcase Mississippi State vs. DePaul and Florida vs. Syracuse in Tampa, Fla.
- Three SEC players active in 2009-10 have recorded triple-doubles, including two that accomplished the feat last season. Arkansas sophomore Courtney Fortson recorded the second triple-double in school history when he had 20 points, 10 rebounds and 11 assists against North Carolina Central on Dec. 10, 2008. Tyler Smith became the first player in Tennessee history to record a triple-double when he had 12 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists against UNC Asheville Dec. 3, 2008. Mississippi State's Jarvis Varnado recorded a triple-double with 10 points, 12 rebounds and 10 blocks against Kentucky in 2007-08.
- According to KenPom.com, in 2008-09 eight of the Southeastern

Conference's 12 teams ranked among the 90 (out of 344 total) youngest teams in the nation. Ole Miss (344), Arkansas (340), Vanderbilt (338), Mississippi State (321) and Florida (312) each rank among the 35 youngest squads.

- Throughout the history of men's college basketball, the Southeastern Conference has captured 10 NCAA Championships and four NIT titles, putting the SEC as one of the nation's top basketball conferences.
- Of the 60 starters at the 2009 SEC Tournament, only 11 were seniors.
- The SEC won 72.6 percent (135-51) of its non-conference games in 2008-09, including 54 of its last 74 games.
- Two SEC schools ranked in the top four nationally in attendance for 2008-09. Kentucky led the nation with an average of 22,239 fans per game and Tennessee was fourth nationally with an average of 20,483 per game. Syracuse was second in the nation in attendance at 21,044 and North Carolina was third with 21,035. Kentucky has led the nation in attendance 13 of the last 14 seasons.
- The SEC individual statistics were dominated by youth in 2008-09. Among the league's statistical leaders, only five of the top 30 scorers, five of the top 30 rebounders and two of the top 15 assist-men were seniors.
- Every team in the SEC has made at least one NCAA Tournament appearance in the last seven editions of the NCAA Tournament.
- The SEC is one of just two conferences in the nation to have all of its teams ranked at least one week in the Associated Press top 25 (excluding preseason polls) since 1999-00. Simply stated, every SEC team has been a top-25 team nationally at one point in the last 10 seasons. The ACC is the only other conference that can make this claim.

Seven SEC Players On Preseason Wooden List

Seven SEC players have been named preseason candidates for the 2009-10 John R. Wooden Award All-American Team and Player of the Year trophy, announced Wednesday, August 19, by Richard "Duke" Llewellyn, Wooden Award Chairman and founder.

SEC players on the list are: South Carolina's Devan Downey, LSU's Tasmin Mitchell, A.J. Ogilvy of Vanderbilt, Kentucky's Patrick Patterson, Tennessee's Tyler Smith, Mississippi State's Jarvis Varnado and Ole Miss Terrico White.

The list of candidates is comprised of 50 student-athletes who, based on last year's individual performance and team records, are the early frontrunners for college basketball's most prestigious honor.

In late December, the Wooden Award Committee will release the Midseason Top 30 list, followed in March by the National Ballot, consisting of approximately 20 top players who have proven to their universities that they are also making progress toward graduation and maintaining a cumulative 2.0 GPA. The Wooden Award All-American Team will be announced the week of the "Elite Eight" round during the NCAA Tournament.

The 34th annual Wooden Award ceremony, which will include the announcement of the Men's and Women's Wooden Award winner, and the presentation of the Wooden Award All-American Teams and the Legends of Coaching Award, will take place the weekend of April 9-11, 2010.

Eight SEC Players On Preseason Naismith List

Eight Southeastern Conference men's basketball student-athletes were among the 50 players on the Naismith 2009-10 preseason watch list, the Atlanta Tipoff Club announced on Oct. 29.

Included among the SEC's candidates are: South Carolina's Devan Downey, LSU's Tasmin Mitchell, Vanderbilt's A.J. Ogilvy, Kentucky's Patrick Patterson, Tennessee's Tyler Smith, Mississippi State's Jarvis Varnado, Kentucky's John Wall and Ole Miss' Terrico White.

The watch list was compiled by the Atlanta Tipoff Club's Board of Selectors, which based its criteria on player performances from the previous year and expectations for the 2009-10 college basketball season. The Naismith Trophy

presented by AT&T will be awarded at the 2010 NCAA Men's Final Four in Indianapolis, Ind.

In late February, the Atlanta Tipoff Club's Board of Selectors will compile a mid-season team of the Top 30 players in the nation. Then in March, the Naismith Trophy voting academy will vote to narrow the list to the four finalists.

Lowe's Senior CLASS Award Candidates

South Carolina's Devan Downey and Tennessee's Tyler Smith - student-athletes who excel both on and off the court - have been tabbed as candidates for the 2009-10 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence - classroom, character, community and competition.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School™, the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

The list of 30 candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 names will be placed on the official ballot. Ballots will be distributed through a nationwide voting system to media, coaches and fans, who will select one finalist who best exemplifies excellence in the four Cs of classroom, character, community and competition.

Arkansas' **Courtney Fortson** recorded just the second triple-double in school history when he had 20 points, 10 rebounds and 11 assists against North Carolina Central on Dec. 10, 2008.

Tyler Smith became the first player in Tennessee history to record a triple-double when he accumulated 12 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists against UNC Asheville Dec. 3, 2008.

Jarvis Varnado registered Mississippi State's third recorded triple-double with 10 points, 12 rebounds and 10 blocks against Kentucky Jan. 15, 2008.

Record Attendance, Again

The SEC posted the largest attendance season attendance in league history, totaling **2,638,852** fans for games featuring SEC teams in 2008-09. It marks the third consecutive year more than 2.5 million fans witnessed SEC basketball. A then-record 2,562,073 fans saw SEC basketball in 2006-07 and 2,561,545 were in attendance for the 2007-08 season.

How Sweet It Is

The Southeastern Conference has had at least one team advance to the Sweet 16 in 19 of the last 20 years. The SEC record for most teams advancing to the Sweet 16 is four which was accomplished in 1986 (Alabama, Auburn, Kentucky, LSU) and in 1996 (Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi State). Eleven of the SEC's 12 members have advanced to the Sweet 16 since 1996.

SEC Among Final Four Leaders

In the last 17 NCAA Tournaments (1993-2009), the SEC's 12 Final Four appearances are the second most by any conference.

The SEC has had a total of five different teams to make the national semifinals, behind only the Big Ten's seven over the 16-year span.

SEC teams have made a total of 22 all-time appearances in the Final Four (27 including five appearances by Arkansas prior to joining the SEC).

First Round Success

The SEC is 41-20 (67.2 percent) in the first round of the NCAA Tournament over the last 11 tournaments (since 1999). In 1999 the SEC won each of its six first round games, becoming the first conference to have six teams win their first round games in the same season.

Second To None

During the 2006-07 academic year the Southeastern Conference became the first conference to win the Division I National Championship in Football (Florida), Men's Basketball (Florida) and Women's Basketball (Tennessee) in the same school year.

Only the SEC and the Big East have ever won both the men's and women's basketball titles in one season. SEC won both three times in 1996, 1998 and 2007. The Big East has won both twice in 2003 and 2004.

The SEC swept both the NIT and NCAA Tournaments in 2006 when Florida won its first NCAA championship and South Carolina earned its second straight NIT title. Only four conferences have won both the NIT and NCAA title, including the Big East (2003), ACC (1992) and Big Ten (1979)

Spreading The Wealth

Since the 1980-81 season, each of the 12 SEC schools has captured either an SEC divisional, overall or tournament title and 11 different schools have won or shared the SEC Championship since the league's inception in 1933.

Alabama went 2-0 on the week with an average margin of victory of 25 points. UA held both opponents to under 40 percent shooting and has now held three straight opponents under 40 percent and four on the season. Alabama didn't allow a UNF field goal on the final 4:03 of the contest and held ULM without a field goal for the first 6:01 of the game marking 10:04 of contiguous action in which Alabama didn't allow a field goal. The Tide opened the game against ULM with a 16-1 advantage that featured a 14-0 run, UA's largest run of the season. Alabama forced 43 turnovers on the week and held a +18 advantage in turnover margin including a season-high 16 steals. Alabama made and attempted a season high in three-pointers against UNF, going 9-of-20. UA surpassed the previous high less than six minutes into the second half

Jemal Farmer scored 18 points, mostly in the second half, to lead the Arkansas Razorback men's basketball team to a 91-54 victory over Mississippi Valley State at Bud Walton Arena on Saturday afternoon. Arkansas had four players score in double digits while all 11 players scored in the win. Mississippi Valley State was outrebounded by 17 and allowed the Razorbacks to score 44 points in the paint. Steph Welsh scored 13 points during the opening 20 minutes of action including three three-point baskets. Moving the ball around the court well, nine of Arkansas' 10 players that saw time in the opening half put points on the board. A 21-point game at the break, Arkansas utilized the whole bench with no player stepping on the court for more than 29 minutes. Arkansas shot 51 percent from the floor while holding the Delta Devils to just 30 percent. Joining Farmer (17) and Welsh (15) in double digits were Marshawn Powell (15) and Julysse Nobles (10). Powell and Farmer each pulled down seven rebounds to lead all players in the game. Arkansas also got solid point guard play from Nobles who, along with his 10 points, grabbed six rebounds, had six assists, just one turnover and two steals. The Razorbacks are back in Bud Walton Arena on Monday, Dec. 7, when they take on the Delaware State Hornets in their final game before finals.

This is the seventh meeting between the Tigers and Cavaliers with series tied 3-3. The teams meet for the fourth time in nine years but did not play each other in the previous 70 years. Auburn defeated Virginia 58-56 in Charlottesville last season on Dec. 20. No. 24 Virginia edged Auburn 89-87 in Richmond on Dec. 3, 2004, and the seventh-ranked Cavaliers defeated Auburn 77-72 in the Arby's Hardwood Classic Dec. 8, 2001, in Birmingham, Ala. Those were the only two contests between the Tigers and Cavaliers after the 1930-31 season. Auburn defeated Virginia 33-26 in the first round of the 1931 Southern Conference Tournament in Atlanta. Auburn won the first game in the series 37-21 during the 1919-20 season in Charlottesville while dropping a 29-27 heartbreaker in the first round of the 1925 Southern Conference Tournament in Atlanta. Auburn has a 2-0 series lead in Charlottesville while Virginia has a 3-1 series lead in games at neutral sites. This is Virginia's first game in Auburn.

Florida improved to 8-0 for just the third time in school history with an 85-67 road win at A-Sun favorite Jacksonville. The Gators scored a season-high 85 points, matching their season high with 12 three-pointers. Florida hit a season-best 56.9 percent from the floor and a season-best 60.0 percent from beyond the arc. The Gators knocked down eight three-pointers in the second half, more than they hit total in six of their previous seven games on the season. Erving Walker matched his career-high with 18 points, hitting 6-of-8 shots and 4-of-5 three-pointers. Vernon Macklin had 16 points and two blocked shots. Kenny Boynton had 15 points, but also six assists to no turnovers. In his last two games he has 15 assist with just one turnover. Dan Werner had 13 points, hitting 3-of-5 shots from three-point range, as the senior is now hitting a team-best 51.9 percent from beyond the arc on the year. The Gators return to action on Thursday with the second of three straight games around the state, taking on Syracuse in Tampa at the SEC Big East Invitational.

Malcolm Delaney scored 31 points and Virginia Tech turned back repeated challenges by Georgia as the Hokies defeated the Bulldogs 74-62 in a non-conference basketball game Sunday afternoon. Travis Leslie led Georgia with 17 points while Dustin Ware and Jeremy Price added 10 apiece. Georgia's leading scorer Trey Thompkins, averaging over 15 points before the game, failed to score a field goal and finished with five points in 30 minutes. Virginia Tech (6-1) broke free from Georgia to build double-digit leads twice in the first half. The first of those came at 28-18 on a Delaney layup with 4:09 left before halftime. Still, the Bulldogs managed to trim their deficit to 33-27 when Albert Jackson scored with 49 seconds left, setting up one of the game's most pivotal exchanges. After Jackson's bucket, Ricky McPhee stole a Tech pass and raced in for a layup, which was blocked by Dorenzo Hudson. Delaney then completed first-half scoring with a buzzer-beating 3-pointer from deep in the right corner. Delaney's 3-point play with 14:30 left gave the Hokies their largest lead of the game at 52-37. Over the ensuing six minutes, however, Georgia crept back into contention. A Price layup got the Bulldogs' margin into single digits at 57-48 with 10:20 left. Thompkins made one of two foul shots with 7:56 remaining to Georgia within 59-53. On Tech's next possession, Victor Davila converted a 3-point play to restore the margin back to 62-53. One final time the Bulldogs were able to get within 62-55 on an Albert Jackson free throw with 6:44 left. Delaney once again rescued the Hokies with a 3-point play. Georgia returns to action Wednesday night when the Bulldogs face St. John's in New York, N.Y., in the SEC – Big East Invitational.

No. 4 Kentucky defeated No. 10 North Carolina 68-66 Saturday afternoon in Lexington. Off to an 8-0 start, UK has jumped out to the best start to a season since the 1992-93 campaign when UK opened 11-0. Kentucky is the NCAA's all-time wins leader with 1,996 wins. UK needs just four more victories to become the first team to eclipse 2,000 wins in college basketball history. North Carolina sits in second place all-time with 1,991 total wins. A crowd of 24,468 fans filled Rupp Arena for the game, setting a new Kentucky record. The attendance surpassed the previous record of 24,465 fans on Feb. 10, 2007, a 64-61 loss against Florida. The Wildcats have out-rebounded their opponent in all eight games this season, besting UNC by just a two-point margin at 39-37. UK finished the game shooting 44-percent from the field and 38-percent from behind the arc. UK has shot over 44-percent in each game this season. Kentucky held North Carolina to 39-percent shooting from the field and 35-percent from three-point land. UK has held each of its opponents to under 50-percent shooting from the field. UK won the points in the paint, 30-28, also getting 18 points in fast break situations, with UNC totaling eight fast-break points. After forcing North Carolina into 16 turnovers, the Wildcats have now forced each opponent into at least 11 turnovers in each game this year. UK will return to action, facing Connecticut in the DirectTV Big East/SEC Invitational, at Madison Square Garden in New York, N.Y. The game will be televised by ESPN, with a tipoff on Dec. 9 at 9:30 p.m. ET.

Senior forward Jarvis Varnado scored 14 points against St. Bonaventure to become the 31st player in MSU history to reach a 1,000 for a career. The milestone came with 6:55 left in the first half on a free throw. Junior forward Kodi Augustus' streak of 18-consecutive free throws made came to an end against the Bonnies. With 214 made 3-pointers, senior Barry Stewart is 44 shy of tying the school record of 258 set by Darryl Wilson from 1994-96. Jarvis Varnado now has 431 career blocks (10th most in NCAA history) and is just 104 shy of tying the mark of 535 set by Wojciech Mydra of Louisiana-Monroe set from 1998-2002. With the 105 points scored against St. Bonaventure, MSU reached triple digits for the 51st time in school history. The 52-point victory against the Bonnies tied for the 11th largest in school history and tied for the largest with Rick Stansbury at the helm. MSU has won by 50 or more points 17 times, with the largest being 75 against Brownsville on 1-22-1909.

South Carolina defeated Western Kentucky and suffered a loss to intrastate rival No. 18 Clemson last week. Freshman forward Lakeem Jackson pulled down a season-best 10 rebounds vs. Western Kentucky, the first rookie to collect double-figure boards since Mike Holmes collected 11 vs. Tennessee on March 14, 2008. Senior forward Evka Baniulis was solid off the bench vs. WKU, scoring 11 points on 4-of-8 shooting from the field. The point total marked his first double-digit effort of the season and his best performance since also scoring 11 points in a Carolina win at Georgia on March 7. Senior guard Brandis Raley-Ross has reached double-figures in four straight contests after pacing Carolina with 16 points at Clemson. Raley-Ross also pulled down eight rebounds vs. the Tigers, one shy of matching his career high. Junior forward Sam Muldrow (13), freshman forward Lakeem Jackson (10) and freshman guard Ramon Galloway (11) also registered double digits against Clemson. South Carolina will take a 10-day break from game action for exams and will resume non-conference play vs. Richmond on Dec. 16 at Colonial Life Arena.

The Tennessee Volunteers are in the midst of fall semester finals week, which runs through next Friday when the Big Orange face Middle Tennessee in a neutral-site clash at Nashville's Sommet Center (site of the 2010 SEC Tournament). The Vols' only action this past week was a 78-66 home win over ETSU, which entered that contest riding a three-game win streak that included an upset victory at Arkansas. Tennessee out-shot and out-rebounded the Buccaneers during an effort that saw UT total 22 assists against just six turnovers. As was the case last season, Tennessee's depth is proving to be a tremendous asset early on this year. UT's bench is outscoring the opponents' bench 236-99 this season (+137 overall and +19.6 ppg). Eight Vols are averaging at least 5.0 ppg, and nine Vols are averaging more than 14 minutes played per game. Four times this season a UT non-starter has scored in double figures, and no Tennessee player ranks among the top 10 in the SEC in minutes played. In five games this season, nine different players have scored for the Vols. Tennessee boasts a +25.0 scoring margin this season while out-rebounding opponents by a 6.6 margin. The Vols have just two more home games this month, while playing at Southern California (Dec. 19) and at Memphis (Dec. 31) in addition to Friday's clash against the Blue Raiders (6 p.m. CT, CSS).

Vanderbilt defeated DePaul 67-54 Saturday in Nashville. With the win Vanderbilt has now won eight in a row at Memorial Gym, including all three games this year. Head Coach Kevin Stallings now has 195 career wins and 129 losses at Vanderbilt, trailing Bob Polk's 197 wins, which ranks second in school history. Roy Skinner's 278 wins is more than any coach in Vanderbilt history. Jeffery Taylor finished with 18 points for the second straight game, reaching double figures in scoring for the 28th time in his career. A.J. Ogilvy scored a team-high 19 points and now has 1,124 for his career, which ranks 31st in school history. Ogilvy made a career high 13-of-15 free throw attempts. It was the second straight game he has attempted at least 10 free throws in a game and the third time in his career he has attempted 10 or more free throws in consecutive games. Ogilvy finished with one block and now has 112 in his career, which is third in school history. Ogilvy trails Julian Terrell (116 blocks) for second place in career blocks. Brad Tinsley had a season-high four rebounds, topping his previous high of two.
