AROUND THE SEC

- 
Kentucky's DeMarcus Cousins, a 6-foot-11, 260-pound freshman forward from Mobile, Ala., was named SEC Player of the Week after he averaged 18.5 points and 15.0 rebounds in leading the Wildcats to wins over Hartford and Louisville. Cousins recorded his fourth straight double-double and his eighth this season with 18 points and 18 rebounds against Louisville. The 18 rebounds tied his career-high are the second most by a Wildcat freshman in a game. The Mobile, Ala., native tallied 19 points and 12 rebounds in just 19 minutes against Hartford earlier in the week. Per 40 minutes, Cousins is averaging 32.1 points and 20 rebounds on the season while averaging 32.9 ppg and 26.7 rpg in Kentucky's two-game swing this past week.
- 
Vanderbilt's John Jenkins, a 6-foot-4, 215-pound guard from Gallatin, Tenn., was named SEC Freshman of the Week after he averaged 17.5 points, 3.5 rebounds and 3.0 assists in leading the Commodores to wins over Manhattan and Southern Miss. Jenkins has led Vanderbilt in scoring in each of the last three games, including a career-high 20 points against Southern Miss on 6-for-6 shooting from behind the arc. He tied a Memorial Gym record for three-point field goal percentage with his perfect night against the Golden Eagles. Jenkins had 15 points and a career-high six rebounds against Manhattan. On the season, he is shooting 47.7 percent from three-point range.
- SEC basketball will tip-off its 77th season this weekend with a docket of five league games. Each of the SEC's 96 conference games will be televised this year.
- LSU will open the defense of its 2009 SEC title this weekend. The Tigers won the SEC championship with a 13-3 league mark last season.
- Six SEC teams are receiving mention in the Jan. 4 polls. Kentucky (3rd Associated Press/3rd ESPN/USA Today), Ole Miss (14th/16th) and Tennessee (16th/15th) are each listed among the Top 25. Florida, Mississippi State and Vanderbilt are receiving votes.
- Kentucky became the first team in NCAA Division I history to win 2,000 all-time games with an 88-44 victory over Drexel on Dec. 21. The Wildcats are 2,003-635 all-time.
- With four blocks against Bethune-Cookman on Nov. 21, Mississippi State's Jarvis Varnado became the SEC's all-time blocked shot leader, breaking Shaquille O'Neal's (LSU) record of 412 from 1990-92. Varnado currently ranks fourth in NCAA Division I history with 468 career blocks.

SEC Highlights

- Five the SEC's top 10 scorers from 2008-09 return for 2009-10. USC's Devan Downey is the league's top returning scorer at 19.8 points per game.
- Seven of the league's top 10 rebounders from last season return for 2009-10. Arkansas' Michael Washington led the SEC with 9.8 boards per game.
- Eight of the conference's top 10 assist leaders from 2008-09 return for 2009-10. Arkansas' Courtney Fortson is the top returning setup man after leading all SEC freshmen with 5.9 assists per game last season.
- Five players that earned first team All-SEC honors from the league's coaches are on SEC rosters for 2009-10. Kentucky's Patrick Patterson, LSU's Tasmin Mitchell, Mississippi State's Jarvis Varnado, South Carolina's Devan Downey and Tennessee's Tyler Smith are were first team all-conference selections in 2008-09. An additional five players that earned second team All-SEC accolades also return.
- For the first time in league history, each of the 96 conference games will be televised live as part of the SEC's historic 15-year agreements with CBS Sports and ESPN that begin this year. Almost half of the SEC's league games will be distributed nationally with ESPN or ESPN2 televising 27 contests, ESPNU showing eight and CBS Sports five. The SEC's games on the ESPN family of networks will be exclusively branded as the "SEC on ESPN."
- National coverage of the SEC Basketball Tournament has been expanded with the semifinals and championship game broadcast on ESPN on ABC. The SEC Network will televise the first two rounds of the tournament which this year will be played March 11-14 in Nashville.
- Florida's Billy Donovan will be honored with the John R. Wooden Award's "Legends of Coaching Award" at the Los Angeles Athletic Club in April of 2010.
- According to KenPom.com, in 2008-09 eight of the Southeastern Conference's 12 teams ranked among the 90 (out of 344 total) youngest teams in the nation. Ole Miss (344), Arkansas (340), Vanderbilt (338), Mississippi State (321) and Florida (312) each rank among the 35 youngest squads.
- Throughout the history of men's college basketball, the Southeastern Conference has captured 10 NCAA Championships and four NIT titles, putting the SEC as one of the nation's top basketball conferences.
- Two SEC schools ranked in the top four nationally in attendance for 2008-09. Kentucky led the nation with an average of 22,239 fans per game and Tennessee was fourth nationally with an average of 20,483 per game. Syracuse was second in the nation in attendance at 21,044 and North Carolina was third with 21,035. Kentucky has led the nation in attendance 13 of the last 14 seasons.

- The SEC individual statistics were dominated by youth in 2008-09. Among the league's statistical leaders, only five of the top 30 scorers, five of the top 30 rebounders and two of the top 15 assist-men were seniors.

- Every team in the SEC has made at least one NCAA Tournament appearance in the last seven editions of the NCAA Tournament.

- The SEC is one of just two conferences in the nation to have all of its teams ranked at least one week in the Associated Press top 25 (excluding preseason polls) since 1999-00. Simply stated, every SEC team has been a top-25 team nationally at one point in the last 10 seasons. The ACC is the only other conference that can make this claim.

Three SEC Players On Wooden Midseason Top 30 List

Three SEC players are among the top 30 candidates for the John R. Wooden Award, the nation's most coveted college basketball honor, it was announced Jan. 4 by The Los Angeles Athletic Club's John R. Wooden Award Committee. Composed of the players who will compete for this season's player of the year award, the attached midseason list is based on individual excellence and team record during the first half of the season.

Among the Midseason Top 30 candidates are Kentucky's Patrick Patterson, Mississippi State's Jarvis Varnado and Kentucky's John Wall.

Just as players who are not on the preseason list are eligible for the Midseason Top 30, players who do not make the Midseason list are still eligible for the national ballot, which will be selected in March and will consist of approximately 20 players, chosen by the Wooden Award National Advisory Board Committee. Players selected to the national ballot will have to be certified by their university as making progress toward graduation and maintaining a cumulative 2.0 GPA.

More than 1,000 voters, comprised of sports media members and college basketball experts from across the nation, will then cast their votes to determine both the 10-member All American Team and Player of the Year. In late March, the 10-player Wooden Award All American Team will be announced.

Eight SEC Players On Preseason Naismith List

Eight Southeastern Conference men's basketball student-athletes were among the 50 players on the Naismith 2009-10 preseason watch list, the Atlanta Tipoff Club announced on Oct. 29.

Included among the SEC's candidates are: South Carolina's Devan Downey, LSU's Tasmin Mitchell, Vanderbilt's A.J. Ogilvy, Kentucky's Patrick Patterson, Tennessee's Tyler Smith, Mississippi State's Jarvis Varnado, Kentucky's John Wall and Ole Miss' Terrico White.

The watch list was compiled by the Atlanta Tipoff Club's Board of Selectors, which based its criteria on player performances from the previous year and expectations for the 2009-10 college basketball season. The Naismith Trophy presented by AT&T will be awarded at the 2010 NCAA Men's Final Four in Indianapolis, Ind.

In late February, the Atlanta Tipoff Club's Board of Selectors will compile a mid-season team of the Top 30 players in the nation. Then in March, the Naismith Trophy voting academy will vote to narrow the list to the four finalists.

Three SEC Guards Named Finalists For Bob Cousy Award

The Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in Springfield, Mass., announced on Jan. 5 that three SEC players were among the 20 finalists for the 2010 Bob Cousy Award presented by The Hartford Financial Services Group, Inc. This annual award is given to college basketball's top point guard and is named after Hall of Famer and former Boston Celtic great Bob Cousy. An original list of 73 candidates made up of players from Division I, II and III schools was trimmed by a Hall of Fame appointed, nationally based committee to the list of 20. Chris Warren (Ole Miss), Devan Downey (South Carolina) and John Wall (Kentucky) were each named finalists.

The current listing of 20 finalists for the 2010 Bob Cousy Award presented by The Hartford will be narrowed down to 10 players by February 1st and than further to five players by March 1st. The final five players in contention for the award will be presented to Mr. Cousy and the Hall of Fame's selection com-

mittee. These Hall of Fame committees are made up of top college basketball personnel including media members, head coaches, Sports Information Directors and Hall of Famers. The winner of the 2010 Bob Cousy Award presented by The Hartford will be awarded at the Hall of Fame's Class Announcement on Monday April 5th in Indianapolis as part of NCAA Final Four weekend.

Lowe's Senior CLASS Award Candidates

South Carolina's Devan Downey and Tennessee's Tyler Smith - student-athletes who excel both on and off the court - have been tabbed as candidates for the 2009-10 Lowe's Senior CLASS Award. To be eligible for the award, a student-athlete must be classified as an NCAA Division I senior and have notable achievements in four areas of excellence - classroom, character, community and competition.

An acronym for Celebrating Loyalty and Achievement for Staying in School™, the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award focuses on the total student-athlete and encourages students to use their platform in athletics to make a positive impact as leaders in their communities.

The list of 30 candidates will be narrowed to 10 finalists midway through the regular season, and those 10 names will be placed on the official ballot. Ballots will be distributed through a nationwide voting system to media, coaches and fans, who will select one finalist who best exemplifies excellence in the four Cs of classroom, character, community and competition.

SEC/Big East Invitational

The third annual SEC/Big East Invitational was held Dec. 9 in New York City and Dec. 10 Tampa, Fla. The two-night men's college basketball event started with a doubleheader in New York City on Dec. 9 and was followed by a doubleheader in Tampa on Dec. 10. St. John's took a 66-56 win over Georgia in the first game at Madison Square Garden in New York City and then No. 4 Kentucky defeated No. 14 Connecticut 64-61 in the nightcap. Mississippi State took care of DePaul 76-45 in the Tampa opener and then No. 10 Florida fell to No. 7 Syracuse 85-73 in the second game. It marked the second consecutive season that the SEC and Big East had earned a split in the event with both conferences winning two of four games each year.

Record Attendance, Again

The SEC posted the largest attendance season attendance in league history, totaling **2,638,852** fans for games featuring SEC teams in 2008-09. It marks the third consecutive year more than 2.5 million fans witnessed SEC basketball. A then-record 2,562,073 fans saw SEC basketball in 2006-07 and 2,561,545 were in attendance for the 2007-08 season.

Triple-Doubles

There are two active SEC players who have recorded a triple-double.

Arkansas' **Courtney Fortson** recorded just the second triple-double in school history when he had 20 points, 10 rebounds and 11 assists against North Carolina Central on Dec. 10, 2008.

Jarvis Varnado registered Mississippi State's third recorded triple-double with 10 points, 12 rebounds and 10 blocks against Kentucky Jan. 15, 2008.

How Sweet It Is

The Southeastern Conference has had at least one team advance to the Sweet 16 in 19 of the last 20 years. The SEC record for most teams advancing to the Sweet 16 is four which was accomplished in 1986 (Alabama, Auburn, Kentucky, LSU) and in 1996 (Arkansas, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi State). Eleven of the SEC's 12 members have advanced to the Sweet 16 since 1996.

SEC Among Final Four Leaders

In the last 17 NCAA Tournaments (1993-2009), the SEC's 12 Final Four appearances are the second most by any conference.

The SEC has had a total of five different teams to make the national semifinals, behind only the Big Ten's seven over the 16-year span.

SEC teams have made a total of 22 all-time appearances in the Final Four (27 including five appearances by Arkansas prior to joining the SEC).

First Round Success

The SEC is 41-20 (67.2 percent) in the first round of the NCAA Tournament over the last 11 tournaments (since 1999). In 1999 the SEC won each of its six first round games, becoming the first conference to have six teams win their first round games in the same season.

During the 2006-07 academic year the Southeastern Conference became the first conference to win the Division I National Championship in Football (Florida), Men's Basketball (Florida) and Women's Basketball (Tennessee) in the same school year.

Only the SEC and the Big East have ever won both the men's and women's basketball titles in one season. SEC won both three times in 1996, 1998 and 2007. The Big East has won both twice in 2003 and 2004.

The SEC swept both the NIT and NCAA Tournaments in 2006 when Florida won its first NCAA championship and South Carolina earned its second straight NIT title. Only four conferences have won both the NIT and NCAA title, including the Big East (2003), ACC (1992) and Big Ten (1979)

Spreading The Wealth

Since the 1980-81 season, each of the 12 SEC schools has captured either an SEC divisional, overall or tournament title and 11 different schools have won or shared the SEC Championship since the league's inception in 1933.

In its first game on an opponent's home court this season, the Alabama men's basketball team defeated Toledo 67-50 Monday night at Savage Arena in Toledo, Ohio. Alabama struck first when senior guard Anthony Brock connected on a three pointer to open the game's scoring. From there the Tide never looked back as they expanded their lead throughout the half, taking 34-19 margin into the halftime break. The Tide opened the second half by outscoring the Rockets 15-7 to take a 23-point lead, which would be its largest of the game. Toledo would twice pull to within 13 points midway through the second half, but Alabama's defense never allowed the Rockets any closer. The Tide's stingy defense held Toledo to 34.5% (17-of-48) shooting from the field and only 16.7% (2-for-12) from beyond the arc. Alabama also forced 11 turnovers. Led by junior forward Justin Knox's perfect 5-of-5 evening, the Tide managed to connect on 50% (22-of-44) of its shots from the field. Knox also hit all four of his free throws attempts to match a career high 14 points. Senior guard Mikhail Torrance led all scorers with 19 points to go along with his four rebounds and three assists, while sophomore forward JaMychal Green added 12 points and grabbed seven rebounds. Alabama will travel to Baton Rouge, La., to take on LSU and begin the Southeastern Conference portion of its schedule on January 9.

The Razorbacks went toe-to-toe with No. 2 Texas on Tuesday night at Bud Walton Arena, but could not upset the Longhorns as a two-point game in the closing moments became 11, 96-85. Arkansas saw the return of Courtney Fortson to the lineup and the sophomore point guard made a huge difference with 18 points and seven assists. Rotnei Clarke led the Hogs in scoring with 24 points on the strength of four three-point baskets. Freshman Marshawn Powell added 19 points for the Razorbacks and preseason All-SEC pick Mike Washington contributed 14. The Razorbacks are now off until their Southeastern Conference opener at Mississippi State on Jan. 14.

DeWayne Reed scored a game-high 20 points while Frankie Sullivan added 17 points and Tay Waller 16 points to lead Auburn to a 96-72 win over Div. II West Georgia in Beard-Eaves-Memorial Coliseum on Tuesday. It was the Tigers' fourth straight win in its final non-conference game before SEC play. Auburn scored a season-high in points and equaled a season-high with 13 three-pointers made for the second consecutive game to go along with a season-low night turnovers. Reed went 8-of-11 from the field, including 4-of-6 from 3-point range, and had six assists to zero turnovers. Sullivan dished out a career-high six assists while Waller went 4-of-9 from behind the arc. Auburn shot 52.1 percent from the field and 39.4 percent on 13-of-33 shooting from 3-point range while making 9-of-13 foul shots. The Tigers outrebounded the Wolves 40-29 and outscored them 46-26 in the paint. West Georgia shot 43.3 percent from the field and 33.3 percent on 9-of-27 shooting from behind the arc. Auburn plays its final SEC opener in Beard-Eaves-Memorial Coliseum history against South Carolina on Saturday at 12:30 pm Central.

Florida won its third consecutive game, as Chandler Parson's 65-foot hoist at the buzzer gave UF a thrilling 62-61 overtime win at North Carolina State. UF won despite shooting just 37.7 percent from the floor and 3-of-24 from three-point range. Vernon Macklin led UF in scoring with 14 points, hitting 7-of-10 shots from the floor, while Erving Walker had 13 points and Alex Tyus 11. Walker went 4-of-4 from the line in overtime to help keep the Gators in the game. After allowing 15 second chance points, including the game-winning put-back in a loss to South Alabama on Dec. 22, UF has allowed just 13 total second chance points in the three games since. The win improved UF to 2-0 in true road games and 4-2 away from Gainesville on the season. Florida has five players averaging in double-figures scoring on the season. After Kenny Boynton's team-leading 13.6 ppg, it's next five scorers highlight UF's balance, scoring within 1.1 points of one another...11.7-10.6 ppg. UF opens SEC play on Saturday at Vanderbilt in search of its ninth straight SEC opening win.

The University of Georgia Bulldogs basketball team finished their non-conference schedule in a big way on Tuesday night, defeating the 20th ranked Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets in front of 6,275 raucous Stegeman Coliseum patrons. Leading the way for Georgia was sophomore forward Trey Thompkins, who contributed 20 points and six rebounds. His mark was felt most in the second half, where he led a Georgia offensive attack with 14 points. Senior guard Ricky McPhee added 16 points, and was four of seven from beyond-the-arc. Sophomore guard Dustin Ware added 13 points, while sophomore forward Travis Leslie registered 12 points and four boards. Tonight's contest marked the 186th times that these two teams have met, with Tech holding a 101-85 series lead over the Bulldogs. The series was played at the Omni Arena in Atlanta for 14 straight years but returned to the home campus sites for the 1995-1996 season. Since then, the home team has won each year except for a 75-70 Georgia win at Georgia Tech in 2000. The Yellow Jackets last defeated the Bulldogs in Athens on November 26th, 1976, in a 64-43 outcome. Next up for the Bulldogs are the 3rd ranked Kentucky Wildcats, who Georgia will meet Saturday in Lexington, Ky.

Kentucky is 15-0 while Louisville is 10-4, ending a five-game win streak by the Cardinals. Kentucky's 15-0 start is its best since the 1969-70 squad opened with 15 consecutive wins. This is the fifth time in school history that the Wildcats have begun a season with at least 15 straight wins. This was the 600th game of Coach John Calipari's career. He has tallied a 460-140 (.767) record. John Calipari's 15-0 start is the best start by a UK coach in his augural season in UK history. This is the seventh time in John Calipari's collegiate coaching career that he has had a winning streak of at least 15 games. Kentucky leads the Louisville series, 27-14. The Wildcats are 165-70 all-time against the current membership of the BIG EAST Conference, including an earlier win this season against Connecticut. Today's attendance of 24,479 is a Rupp Arena attendance record. The previous mark was 24,468 earlier this season vs. North Carolina. After a mid-week open date, the Wildcats open Southeastern Conference action on Sat. Jan. 9 at home against Georgia. The game will tip off at 4 p.m. and will be a regionally syndicated telecast on the SEC Network.

The Tigers open the 2010 Southeastern Conference season at home Saturday at 4 p.m. on FSN against the University of Alabama. This will mark the seventh time since 2000 and the first time at home since 2001 that LSU has opened conference play with Alabama. The teams have split games each of the last two years. LSU is 42-34 all-time in SEC openers. The Tigers broke a three-game losing streak Monday night in an 83-60 win over McNeese State, the Tigers 80th consecutive win at home against Louisiana schools, a streak that began on Dec. 8, 1988. The Tigers scored 50 second half points and shot 73 percent (19-of-26) from the field, including 7-of-9 from three-point range. It was the first time LSU had shot 70 percent in a half since twice in conference play during the 2006 NCAA Final Four season. This will be the 600th men's basketball game played in the Pete Maravich Assembly Center on Saturday, dating back to the first game with Vanderbilt on January 2, 1973. Tasmin Mitchell had another double double in the McNeese win, his sixth of the season. He is ninth on the all-time scoring list at LSU and needs 12 rebounds to crack the top 10 in rebounds at LSU. He is one of nine players to have scored 1,500 points and grabbed 750 rebounds in a career. He is on pace to become the third player in LSU history to score 2,000 career points, 23 players have previously scored 2,000 career points at SEC schools.

The No. 14 Ole Miss Rebels got a 21-point performance from Terrico White and closed out their non-conference slate with an 84-56 victory over UCF on Tuesday night. Ole Miss improved to 12-2, its best non-conference record since it went a perfect 14-0 in the 2007-08 regular season. Chris Warren scored 14 points against the Knights and became the 31st player in school history to reach 1,000 points in a career. Eniel Polynice added 16 points against UCF, and Murphy Holloway posted his third double-double of the year with 11 points and 10 rebounds. Ole Miss had 10 blocks in the contest, and Terrance Henry swatted a career-high six, tied for the fourth-most in a game in school history. The Rebels have won eight of their last nine games as they enter SEC play. They host Mississippi State on Saturday (12:30 p.m., SEC Network) to begin league play. The Rebels are 26-50 all-time in SEC openers and last won their league opener in 2006. They are beginning league play at home for the first time since 2007 and just the third time in the last 12 seasons.

A furious rally came up short Monday night as the Mississippi State Basketball Bulldogs dropped a 55-52 decision to Western Kentucky in WKU's Diddle Arena. MSU saw a nine-game win streak snapped. However, the contest suddenly was in doubt after the Hilltoppers managed only one field goal in the final 7:00 of regulation. MSU reeled off a 13-2 run and actually had a chance to lead when Jarvis Varnado missed a 10-foot jump shot in the lane with 15 seconds left. Anthony Sally then closed matters with a pair of free throws with three seconds remaining. For the contest, the Bulldogs hit 17 of 47 shots from the field (36.2 percent), 4 of 19 shots from 3-point range (21.1 percent) and 14 of 27 shots from the foul line (51.9 percent). The Hilltoppers hit 19 of 55 shots from the field (34.5 percent), 5 of 19 shots from 3-point range (26.3 percent) and 12 of 16 shots from the foul line (75.0 percent). MSU had seven assists and 18 turnovers, while WKU had 10 assists and 13 turnovers. For the Bulldogs, the free throw percentage was a season low while the turnover number was second most on the season, trailing only the 19 made at Houston. Varnado recorded his 23rd career double double with 17 points and 12 rebounds. Bost was also in double figures with 13 points and a team-high five assists. Southeastern Conference play is next for Mississippi State. The Bulldogs play 14th-ranked Ole Miss in a 12:30 p.m. start Saturday at Tad Smith Coliseum in Oxford.

South Carolina snapped a two-game losing streak with an 88-58 victory over Longwood on Tuesday in its final non-conference contest of the regular season. Freshman guard Ramon Galloway made his first career start against the Lancers, scoring 15 points, his eighth double-figure scoring game of the season. Senior point guard Devan Downey, who was named a Cousy Award finalist on Tuesday, led the Gamecocks with 18 points in the contest vs. Longwood. Downey also added six assists and three steals. Senior forward Evaldas Baniulis enjoyed a breakout game vs. Longwood, shooting 5-of-8 from beyond the arc en route to a season-best 15 points. It marked Baniulis' best performance in a game since also scoring 15 points against Princeton on Dec. 2, 2008. With the win, South Carolina posted a winning record outside of conference play for the 11th consecutive season. The Gamecocks begin SEC action on Saturday at Auburn.

Tennessee ended Memphis' 23-game home win streak last Thursday by posting a 66-59 victory at the FedExForum. The Volunteers have now beaten the cross-state rival Tigers in each of their last two tries in Memphis. Tennessee out-rebounded the Tigers 47-28 and held them to 31 percent shooting while improving to 10-2 on the year. UT closes out the non-conference portion of the regular season this week with home games against Charlotte Wednesday night (7 p.m. ET, CSS) and top-ranked Kansas on Sunday (TBA, CBS). Sophomore shooting guard Scotty Hopson continues to lead the Vols in scoring with 13.3 points per game. Senior Wayne Chism, who had a team-high 15 points and nine rebounds in the win at Memphis, is Tennessee's top rebounder with 5.8 boards per game while ranking third on the squad in scoring with a 10.9-point average. The Vols are shooting .475 from the floor this season while holding opponents to .389 shooting. UT's scoring margin stands at +18.4, and the Vols also boast a +7.0 turnover margin. The Vols enter the week with four players—Melvin Goins, Tyler Smith, Cameron Tatum and Brian Williams—indefinitely suspended from all team activities pending the results of an investigation stemming from an incident in Knoxville last Friday morning. Announcements on further disciplinary actions will be forthcoming.

Vanderbilt improved to 11-3 on the season, while Middle Tennessee State fell to 7-7. Vanderbilt has now won 13 in a row at Memorial Gym, including all eight games this year. VU's last home loss was against Florida on Jan. 25, 2009. Vanderbilt's 8-0 start to the season is the sixth under Head Coach Kevin Stallings (2007-08, 2004-05, 2003-04, 2001-02, 1999-00). The 2009-10 season is the 110th in Vanderbilt's history. Today's meeting was the 31st all-time between Vanderbilt and MTSU. Vanderbilt leads the all-time series 27-4 and has won the last three meetings. Vanderbilt is now 15-0 against MTSU at home. Kevin Stallings is 2-0 all-time against MTSU. Vanderbilt is now 52-15 all-time against teams from the Sun Belt Conference. VU is now 1-1 on the season against teams from the Sun Belt after losing to Western Kentucky on Dec. 11 at the Sommet Center. With Jermaine Beal's three-pointer with 13:37 remaining in the first half, Vanderbilt extended its consecutive games streak with at least one three-pointer made to 743. VU is one of only three schools (UNLV and Princeton) that have made at least one three-pointer in every game played since the three-point line was established for the 1986-87 season. Only UNLV (751) has a longer streak than Vanderbilt. Vanderbilt had five players reach double figures in scoring for the second time this season (Mercer). Reaching double figures were Beal, Ezeli, Ogilvy, Jenkins and Taylor).
